Strawberry Plants - \$2/plant in 2"pot Ozark Beauties, Honeoye & Sparkle SPECIAL - \$50 for a flat of 32 plants

Raspberry Red & Gold Mix \$10 These are plants from our mixed raspberry patch & I cannot tell them apart, but they produce well for us!

Fall Red Everbearing Raspberry \$10 Early first crop, great for northern gardens. Stout, vigorous canes yield medium-to-large, bright-red berries rich in flavor and berry aroma. Berries are great on their own for fresh eating as well as being used in jams, salads, or snacks. Cold-hardy. Early fall-bearing (everbearing) primocane with a summer crop. Floricane berries ripen in June and July.

Primocane berries ripen mid-August through frost. Self-pollinating.

Latham Raspberry \$10 - Easy to pick! Firm berries provide durability during harvest. Adapts well to a range of soil types.

Upright growth habit. Burgundy fall foliage adds landscape interest. Fruit is outstanding for fresh-eating, freezing, and canning.

Cold-hardy. Ripens in mid July. Self-pollinating.

Primocane Red Raspberry Varieties \$10 - Cold-hardy. Fall-bearing (everbearing) primocane with a summer crop. Floricane berries ripen in July. Primocane berries ripen in September through frost. Self-pollinating.

Anne Yellow Raspberries \$10 - This sunshine-colored fruit has a unique flavor with hints of apricot. These large, sweet, firm berries will liven up tarts, jams and salads. They also freeze well. The hardy and productive plant bears in the first year. Cold-hardy and heat-tolerant. Fall-bearing (everbearing) primocane with a summer crop. Floricane berries ripen in July and August. Primocane berries ripen in September through frost. Self-pollinating.

Royalty Purple Raspberry \$10 - Our perfect purple raspberry! Plant is vigorous, hearty and resistant to insects. Yields large, sweet berries with great flavor. Fruit never fades, even when canned or frozen. Cold-hardy. Late-summer bearing. Ripens in August. Self-pollinating.

Black Raspberry Canes \$10 - Not to be planted with the red or gold. These black raspberries need a separate space.

Jersey Blueberry - A hearty, healthy blueberry. Enjoy abundant crops of large, crack-resistant, light blue berries. Plant has ornamental appeal in the landscape with its tall, attractive shape.

Developed in 1916, introduced in 1928. Cold-hardy. Ripens in August. Self-pollinating, but will yield larger crops if pollinated with Bluecrop or Earliblue.

Earliblue Blueberry - One of the first blueberries of the season. Well-shaped, upright and vigorous plants with dark green foliage. Produces reliable crops of aromatic, light-blue berries.

Developed in 1936, introduced in 1952. Ripens in June. Self-pollinating, but will yield larger crops if pollinated with Bluecrop or Jersey.

Gooseberry:

Invicta Green Gooseberry - Twice the production of other green gooseberries. This plant bears abundant crops of large berries that are delicious fresh or in pies or preserves. Mildewresistant and cold-hardy. Ripens in July. Self-pollinating.

Hinnonmaki Red Gooseberry - A unique tart and sweet combination. Tart skin covers the sweet flesh of these tasty, ruby berries, so you can enjoy both flavors. Perfect for making pies and jams. Bushes are heavy producers, even when young. Mildewresistant and cold-hardy. Ripens in July. Self-pollinating

Goji Berry - \$25 For centuries the Chinese have used parts of the entire goji berry plant for food or medicine. Use of stems and leaves is little known in the United States, but the highest concentrations of healthful antioxidants can be found in the leaves . Fruit in the health food market in the form of dried berries and juice is more familiar. The Lycium barbarum variety of Gogi Berry Plants are a perennial in zones 3 to 10, they are actually quite remarkably heat and cold tolerant. Goji plants are also deciduous, which just means that they drop their leaves every year, usually once the first frost hits. Goji Berry plants are very adaptable, but for the very best results, test your soil, and then adjust the pH to between 6.8 - 8.1. You can add lime to raise the pH if necessary or aluminum sulfate to lower it.

Jostaberry- \$25 Self-pollinating The rich, berry taste of the Jostaberry is a blend between black currant and gooseberry flavorful,- - sweet and satisfying. Pleasant aftertaste, too. Fruits are abundant starting early July usually the second year. The Jostaberry produces glossy round berries that are firm, plump, and just loaded with vitamin C juice. Far north plantings of the Jostaberry showed absolutely no dieback after temps to 40 below zero. Immune to, or lives with most major pests. Mature height of the Jostaberry will be about 4-6 ft. Width 4ft.

Nero Aronia Chokeberry - \$25 Self-Pollinating In spring Aronia is covered with clusters of white, sweet scented flowers followed by shiny green berries that turn a dark bluish black in late summer to early fall, depending on location. Nero Aronia's blueberry size fruit can be eaten fresh, usually with a sweetener and is known for making delicious and nutritious juices and wine. Up to 10 times the amount of antioxidants as other berries, rich in Vitamin C, a great health benefit! Outstanding fall color of flaming red. The Nero Aronia is an extremely adaptable shrub, rarely bothered by insects or diseases and high tolerance to salt making it ideal for roadside plantings. Once established Nero Aronia is highly drought tolerant. Adapts to most soils but does best in a well-drained soil and a sunny area. Our variety, Nero, was developed in Europe where it is valued for its nutritious fruit and as an ornamental shrub. Reaches 3 to 4' at maturity and is hardy to -40 degrees

Honeyberry - \$25 Cinderella & Borealis varieties - Need one of each to polinate and get fruit. This is the first bush to bloom in our yard every year! Abundant harvests of large berries! Fragrant white flowers quickly give way to sweet and tart, plump berries with a taste similar to blueberries. Harvest as soon as early June. Eat them fresh, freeze them, or make a batch of luxurious preserves or fruit liqueur. Plants are densely foliated and have a nice upright growth habit. Cold-hardy. Can take temperatures of up to -50°F and are a favorite in regions where the cold prohibits many fruiting plants. Early-bearing.
